


How is YOUR Imagination?

Bench Tips

. Flying off the handle is never good, particularly if it's a hammer head. The traditional way to tighten a loose hammer head is a bit of work, but there's a fast and easy solution available for about 50 cents - superglue. Simply put a couple drops in from the handle side, let it set up, and then a few drops from the top side. Be sure to get the thin superglue, not gel. It penetrates better. Packages of two superglues each are usually available at the 99 cent store.

The sanding boards for doing your nails are one of my favorite finishing tools. I use the ones with a thin foam core. They have enough resistance to sand just the high points off a flat surface and yet give a little when you're trying to smooth off a curved surface. Plus they're inexpensive and come in a variety of grits. Some grits are so fine they give an almost finished surface. Pick up a few at your local drug store or beauty Supply Company.

A ready source of free tools is your local dentist. Dental picks can be reworked into wax tools or straightened and sharpened to make a stylus for marking and layout. The steel in these tools is high quality, and the handles are designed for comfort. A special note however - don't try to bend one of the tips to a different shape - the steel will snap. To change the shape, heat the tip to red-hot and bend it with pliers while it's hot.

And don't forget to ask your dentist for some of the cutting burs they throw out. These are useful for a variety of things. It's best to call a week or two before your visit and ask the dentist to put some of these tools aside for you. It's good practice also to ask that they run them through the sterilizer for you.

When bezel setting a transparent cabochon in silver, I worry that the silver will tarnish under the stone and will destroy the brilliance of its color & pattern. So I take one extra step before setting the stone. I place a piece of thin silver Mylar plastic under the stone to act as a mirror that will never tarnish.

This Mylar is readily available in craft and gift wrap stores, or in a pinch from a party balloon supplier. You may want to experiment with using colored or patterned Mylar (i.e. diffraction pattern) under some stones.

I met a jewelry designer in Vienna 15 years ago who did the same with synthetic star sapphires to give them color (they were white and transparent to begin with.) At first I didn't believe it, but it worked. I leave my bezels open on the bottom and burnish them closed.

CCMA Report Released

Good morning all,

The preliminary analysis of the study conducted by the State regarding asbestos exposure has just been released this morning by the OHMVR Division of State Parks.

This is the link to the study, as well as a press release from the division announcing the release: http://ohv.parks.ca.gov/default.asp?page_id=1140

I've picked out the key passage below in the Executive Study - but overall the outcome of the study was very, very positive. The study was done specifically to evaluate the effect on motorcycle riding considering up to 5 riding days per year. The study noted; "Based on the IERF analysis, the results of which are included herein, there is clearly an opportunity to allow OHV recreation at CCMA. Under the conditions we observed, and similar seasonal conditions, OHV enthusiasts would not be exposed to unacceptably high levels of airborne asbestos "

Simply put, this is great news. For enthusiasts everywhere, this couldn't be a better conclusion. There are some parameters of the study that should be noted, such as the limited number of riding days, as well as a notice that exposure could be higher on very dry, dusty days. But all in all, this study completely refutes the EPA conclusions.

Now it is up to the BLM to act. Enthusiasts will be expecting the BLM to change their previous stance on OHV activity in Clear Creek, and we will be anxiously their response. The BLM website is still noting the release of their final for public review will be in March/April 2011.




