

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IN A SUNBURNED COUNTY BOOK REVIEW Wayne W Mills, OMS



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I just finished another Bill Bryson book, this one is about Australia. It is a big, isolated and amazing country (the largest island the sixth and largest continent in the world) that has been "on its own" for about 96,000,000 years, and due to its' isolation has developed an unusual,

unique, varied and impressive fauna and flora. New discoveries in both areas are still being made. One example is the platypus.

"When word reached England in 1799 that there existed in Australia a toothless, venomous, furcovered, egg-laying, semi-aquatic animal with a duck -like bill, the tail of a beaver, feet that were both webbed and clawed, and a strange orifice called a *cloaca* which served both reproductive and excretory purposes...it was received, not surprisingly, as a hoax."

"For most of the next century, scientists argued --and argued heatedly, for it was an age obsessively devoted to exactitude-over how to classify the animal after putting it and its cousin the echidna (a creature similar to the hedgehog) in a family of their own: the monotremes. (The name means "onehole" in reference to the distinguishing colaca)." The animals laid eggs, a reptilian (and avian) trait, but suckled heir young, a mammalian trait. The monotremes eventually wound up the in mammalian camp, but for a while it was a close race.

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Not that platypuses have much to do with rocks, but they represent part of the diversity of the land. Australia has some memorable rocks too. One of these is Ayers Rock (near Alice Springs in the Northern Territories--well, 468 kilometers [290 miles] near), now called Uluru since it has been placed back in control of the Native Aborigines to whom it is sacred. Uluru, a huge sandstone monolith is one of the largest in the world—1,150 feet high, a mile and a half long, and five and a half miles around. It rises abruptly from a flat desert.

Another of the unusual rock formations mentioned by Bryson is the Devils Marbles just off the road from Darwin to Alice Springs in the Northern Territory that are many miles from anywhere. (Though as Bryson points out, most places in Australia are [many] miles from anywhere.) Imagine a desert about 3/4 the size of the Continental United States with eight major cities on its periphery and in the middle six major deserts, scattered towns, and sheep stations. Bryson describes the Devil Marbles as "...enormous piles of smooth granite boulders, many as big as houses, stacked in jumbled piles or scattered over an immense area (eighteen hundred hectares (4448 acres), according to a signboard). Every one brought to mind something else: a jelly bean, a bread roll, a bowling ball-except that they were immense and often perched on impossibly fine points. Imagine a boulder maybe thirty feet high nearly and spherical standing on a base little larger than, say, a manhole cover." 



The ORE-CUTTS, named after William Orcutt, was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor.

The Orcutt Mineral Society (OMS) was founded in 1958, was also named after William Orcutt. He was a geologist and civil engineer who, in



1888, worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits in Los Angeles, on the property of Captain Alan Hancock there. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences.

Additionally, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth to guide the officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these aims. OMS affiliations include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.


