Benitoite

Rick Kennedy will be speaking at our Gem Show about the Benitoite Gem Mine, the significance of this unique gemstone, and demonstrating how to "etch" mine run rock to free up crystals. Please join us Saturday afternoon at 1:00 pm, and Sunday at noon. Benitoite is the only mineral that crystallizes in the trigonal bipyramidal form. It is a lovely blue-purple color and is a beautiful and valuable gemstone. Benitoite fluoresces a deep blue color under short wave ultraviolet light.

The mine is located at the southern end of the Diablo Range, a belt of mountains along the west side of California's San Joaquin Valley. The range is built of rocks of the Jurassic Franciscan Formation (graywacke, shale, chert and basalt), and serpentine with Cretaceous and Tertiary sandstones.

One of the largest blocks of serpentine in the Diablo Range occurs in the New Idria District (about 100 miles north of Nipomo in San Benito County). During the time that the New Idria serpentine block has been in place there have been periods during which solutions percolated through the fracture systems. The Benitoite Gem Mine is located in one of these blocks. Benitoite, neptunite, joaquinite and other minerals formed in the cavities and filled pore spaces in felted amphibole

Rick will bring mine run material which we will view in the Fluorescent Room during the show. Some of the material will be available for sale at the show.

Member Profile

Wes Lingerfelt

The first in a series of articles about members of OMS Wes Lingerfelt's lapidary products are distributed at least halfway around the world. The 10 bolo ties he made for the Russian delegation to the 1992 START (Strategic Arms Reduction Treaty) talks are proudly displayed in and around Moscow, Russia. His spheres are widely distributed across the American Southwest. His tumbled stones are objects of awe and inspiration for many children in northern

Santa Barbara and southern San Luis Obispo County. Many who visit his lapidary shop with broken family heirloom or sentimental jewels depart with expertly repaired and shining pieces of fine jewelry. In addition, he has a fine collection of lapidary materials,

minerals and fossils that he proudly displays and discusses with any visitors to his shop who show the slightest interest.

Wes joined the Orcutt Mineral Society in Santa Maria, California in 1983, and served as Society President in 1989, 1995 and 1996. Wes has served as CFMS (California Federation of Mineral Societies) Federation Director since 1989, and was CFMS Treasurer for 2 years. Wes was given the Golden Bear Award for his services to OMS in 1996, and in 1998, and recognized by CFMS as member of the year from our society.

Wes has led several successful field trips, including a recent one to Hallelujah Junction north of Reno, Nevada where he found a pit and managed to consistently pull quality quartz crystals from his hole while the younger rockhounds on either side found very little. When he pulled a 4-inch clear quartz on smoky quartz scepter from his hole, they really began to think of him as having a magic touch. This was confirmed 2 days later when the group was digging

for petrified wood near Winnemucca, Nevada. Wes jumped into a hole that had been dug several years prior, near one of the "younger" rockhounds. After about ½ hour, Wes heard a "clink", and said "That sounds good!" His find turned out to be the tip of a 3-foot round petrified tree trunk that was part of a log jam, and yielded several nice pieces of wood for all present.

His school presentations are always eagerly anticipated by children in local elementary schools, partly because his topic is so interesting, and partly because he brings tumbled stones for each of the children in the class.

Wes' favorite lapidary materials and locations include Stonewall Pass, and Tuscarora, Nevada for their petrified wood, Clear Creek in San Benito County for plasma agate, Stone Canyon near Parkfield (Kern County) for brecciated jasper, and Nipomo, San Luis Obispo County, California (where

he lives) for sagenite and marcasite agate.
Montana agate is also a favorite. Wes has recently completed a 9-inch sphere of marcasite (that he found) that is

breathtaking with its swirls of agate and golden flowers of the iron sulfide metal.

Wes has striven for excellence throughout his life, and has accomplished much in his chosen field (rocket science), in his private life, and in his hobby. Because of his expertise in trajectory analysis, he was chosen to represent the United States at the 1992 START talks with Russia. At that conference, Wes, already an accomplished lapidarian, presented the Russian Delegation with hand-made bolo ties that became highly prized by those gentlemen.

Wes has been married 44 years and has three children who have flourished under his and wife Jeannie's guidance. Wes's father was a jeweler, and perhaps this is where his love of stones began. Wes's outstanding contributions to the hobby include his broad knowledge of lapidary materials and methods,

and the selfless application of his knowledge and abilities wherever they are needed. When anyone in the club comes to him with a jewelry or lapidary problem, Wes spends as much time as necessary to cut, slice, cab, polish, solder, or do whatever else is necessary to help. Through his lapidary business, he has made friends around the world. He has had rockhound visitors from Australia, New Zealand and across the country, and has always striven to show them a great time when they stay with him.

One of the younger members of our society said that "Wes is so good at what he does, he inspires me to want to improve my (lapidary) art". One of his long-time rockhound friends observed, "Wes has always striven for excellence in everything he does.

This applies to his work and his hobby. That is the reason he was well respected in his profession, and why his cabs and spheres are so eagerly sought after." But perhaps Wes's greatest contribution to the hobby is his selfless dedication to "doing what has

to be done" to keep OMS going. Whenever anyone in the club has a large rock to cut or a stone to finish for a piece of jewelry, they can take it to Wes, and he will "help" them complete it. This often means watching while he puts an expert shape and polish on the rock, but the end product is something to be proud of. Wes is truly a rockhound's rockhound and a great person as well.

CFMS IN PLACERVILLE

The 63rd annual CFMS Show was held in Placerville the weekend of July 12-14 The El Dorado Fairgrounds is picturesque, and the buildings large enough to accommodate dealers in the main building, exhibits in another, and competition cases in a third.

The quality of the exhibits was first rate, and included the Sixteen-to-One Mine that showed off their "Whopper" nugget, containing 122 ounces of gold (10.16 pounds Troy) in a 13-pound quartz matrix. The Stillsons of the El Dorado Club exhibited at least 6 cases, each of which could win a trophy in AFMS Competition. They had cases of rhodochrosite, quartz and fluorite from various locales, one of Scrimshaw, one of Native American materials, and one of gold. Another stunning display was the Fluorescent Mineral Society who set up a 10-foot x 10-foot dark room with about 10 display cases of awesome fluorescent material.

In the competition area, there were about 16 cases with entries in several categories. This competition brings out a lot of creativity, and there was some beautiful "stuff" shown here. For me, one of the highlights was Gail Matthews' case of special features in petrified wood that earned her a trophy in the Petrified Wood Category. Cal Clauson's cabochons were another highlight, as were some of the spheres. I saw one of silver lace onyx with a great polish and a lot of depth to it that gave me a much greater appreciation for this material. Another sphere that really caught my eye was clear, tourmalinated quartz about 3-inches in diameter that was a real eye-catcher.

A personal highlight of the competition was that my carving of the Venus of Willendorf got a first place trophy from the Gem Carvers Guild in the Beginners category, and my case of Chumash Soapstone Artifact Reproductions got a first place in the Novice Education

Category.

Demonstrators were a hardy bunch as they were outside under awnings in triple digit temperatures. Demonstrations of wire wrapping, faceting, the Barranca wet polisher, geode cutting, carving, scrimshaw, gold panning, and kids activities were available. They even had a large board with cut outs for faces, and an old-west scene painted on it for photo opportunities.

The El Dorado Club put a lot of effort into their show, and I think they set a pretty high bar for the Del Air Rockhounds Club (with help from Ventura, Oxnard and Conejo Clubs) that will host the June 5-8, 2003 Seaside Gem-boree AFMS/CFMS at the Ventura Fairgrounds. You might want to put that date on your calendars! For more information, contact 818-883-7851. Please note that this will be "a really big shew", since it combines the talents of AFMS and CFMS.

I hope this inspires many *Ore-Cutts* readers to start working on their displays for next year. There should be a lot of interesting cases from across the country at that show.

Treasure Hunt at Lucy's

It's only been a few months since the club made a collecting trip to Rosamond, but we are already dreaming about the next trip to the desert in search of agatized palm, jasper, quartz, and chalcedony, plus a stop at Lucy Tunnell's rockpile. Going to Kramer Junction is definitely a winter or springtime trip since the weather is usually hot.

We met more than 60 rockhounds from as far away as San Francisco and San Diego at the Café on Highway 395, and caravanned to the first collection site. Barbara Donati, one of our Australian members, joined us in this adventure. Before we began collecting, Lew Helfrich, of the Bakersfield club, rounded us up to show samples of the agatized palm, warned us about scorpions and snakes, then set us free for an hour of collecting. Most people came away with at least a 5 gallon bucket of material to share.

A rock exchange activity was held just before we loaded back into our cars for the next site. Everyone was asked to bring rock from their home area, and exchange it with someone from another area. Dick and I ended up with a large piece of honey onyx which we received in trade for our Figueroa Mountain brecciated jasper.

Our second stop was off Highway 58, halfway

between Kramer Junction and Mojave.. I still don't know how the Bakersfield folks found this location, and marvel at their navigation skills. Going north on Gephart Road, it was somewhere between Saddleback Mountain and Galileo Hill WAY OUT THERE. We found plenty of deep honey colored jasper, and quartz on the red sand slopes. The group spent an hour collecting and eating lunch at this location.

The third stop was just off Gephart Road, halfway back to Highway 58 from the previous collection site. I was running on gas fumes, so I missed this spot, but saw the chalcedony and quartz samples that others brought back, and believe it should be good fluorescing material.

As I stated before, I had to make a "quick trip to town for gas", and got a head start at Lucy's rockpile!!!
Lucy had dreams of a large swimming pool in her

backyard, but somehow never did get around to finishing it. Instead, Lucy and her late husband decided to store rock in it. The pool is full of giant boulders of rhodonite, petrified wood, etc.. This is in addition to 100 or more stacked 50 gallon drums full of identified material. Ralph Bishop hopes to someday find the bottom of the swimming hole, and did his best to make a dent in the pile. Most of us limited ourselves to taking home 150 - 200 pounds of treasure. And, we were invited back for a nighttime fluorescing experience at a later date.

The next time you hear an announcement at the General Meeting, or read about a "Treasure Hunt at Lucy Tunnell's Home", please join us for another jaunt to the desert.
