## Agates in Munich 2005

What a unique experience to be invited as a guest to the biggest agate show ever assembled in the world at Munich in Germany on the last weekend of October 2005. Agate was the theme of this Gem and Mineral show, the second biggest in the world. The famous Hooded Owl Agate from Texas in U.S.A. was the symbol of the show (picture right).

Munich is a big modern city, re-built after the war and is about the same size as Brisbane. It was host to the 1972 Olympic Games. I found most prices of goods about one third to fifty per cent dearer than here in Australia because of our poor exchange rate with the Euro. Most Germans speak English or at least try to help you.

The weather was cool to cold, foggy every morning till about mid-day when a hazy sun appeared for several hours. This was early winter. My hotel was located about 10 kilometres away


from the show with a free bus shuttle to the show and you had to return by underground railway.

This show was huge, even by Tucson standards. It was held in three of the six halls of the Munich convention centre. Each hall had a floor area of about 6000 square metres. They used to be aircraft hangers to service the big passenger jet aircraft when this area was the International airport. They moved the airport several years ago. Each hall had between 700 and 800 traders and dealers from 22 countries as well as from every country in Europe.

The catalogue was as thick as the Gold Coast telephone book. A first for this show and a precedent for all other shows in the future was the half price entrance fee for the last three hours on the Sunday. Over 60,000 people attended the show. A special display of worldwide agate specimens covered 1200 square metres.

It was set out in sections for Europe, U.S.A., Americas, and the rest of the world, which included Australia and Africa. All the best agates in the world, as well as the authors and scientists of the agate world were in the one place at the same time. (Editors Note: "Achat Träume" translates to "Agate Dreams")

Very high security prevailed. World famous museums throughout Europe and Russia made



magnificent displays of their most valuable and historic agate artefacts and specimens. I saw huge bowls, vases, boxes, animals and creatures carved from agate. One of the most unique showcases which included a video was of agates collected from the bottom of Lake Superior in Canada.

My showcase of Queensland agates displayed 75 beautiful agates, 22 pieces of agate jewellery and 10 carved cabochons. This was a contribution from 10 private collections. I had one of my books tied to the front of the showcase so visitors could look through it. All my books available at the show were sold out on the second day. I saw huge polished agates up to 700mm across and spheres about 300mm in diameter, as well as thousands of smaller agate specimens. Entrance to the 3 day show and a 2 metre showcase to display Queensland agates was granted to me free of charge.

The latest book in the world on agates written by Professor Johann Zenz and Rainer Bode was available at many stalls throughout the show. It is a beautiful book of 656 pages with over 2000 colour photographs. It is printed in German and English and contains 24 pages on Australia and New Zealand. On my tour around the world last year with my research into formations and inclusions in agates and quartz gemstones, my 200 slide programme on the subject in Vienna, Austria, inspired Erica Zenz, wife of

the author of the latest book on agate to make bigger posters and framed photos of her similar research. She had a magnificent display which was much admired.

I enjoyed the show immensely, also the lectures and slide shows by specialists in their field. It was an opportunity of a lifetime; I would like to thank every one too numerous to mention by name that made it possible for me to attend.

Added from the Howard's 2005 Christmas letter:

"Today is November 15th, the anniversary of the day we set off from home on the Gold Coast in our motorhome to live our dream to travel Australia to see places we have never seen before. ## A Night at Hancock

In my capacity as Scholarship Chairman, I attended a reception for donors sponsored by the Alan Hancock Foundation on Thursday, November 10. My friend Susan and I found the Student Union after asking directions, and were greeted by soft guitar music, and friendly staff. At the wine and hors d'oeuvres reception, we were able to converse with other donors, and to hear the new college superintendent, José M. Ortiz, Ed.D, outline some of his goals for the college. Dr. Ortiz replaced Dr. Ann Foxworthy about 4 months ago. Dr. Foxworthy retired after 13 years on the job. One of Dr. Ortiz's big projects is to help the college sponsor an initiative to raise money for upgrading college facilities, including \$8 million dollars for a new mainframe for their computer system. The current system is 15-years old. My computer is a lot newer than that (and it is outdated)!

Before we left the reception, we had the opportunity to talk to Tim Flemming, executive director for the foundation. Mr. Flemming provided us the fascinating statistic that the California Community College system with 1.6 million students in 108 community colleges is the largest such institution in the world. And yes, I did the math, and that is about 14,000 students per campus. An additional notable fact from Mr. Flemming was that about 70% of the community college attendees are the first members of their families to do so.

Orcutt Mineral Society has provided annual scholarships to Earth Science Students at both Alan Hancock and Cuesta Community Colleges, and we can be justifiably proud of our contributions. Ten percent of the net profits from our annual gem show form the core of our scholarship program.

### Fossil Turtle Talk

The November OMS General Meeting speaker, Wayne Mills, provided the members with a wealth of information about fossil turtles. Wayne is currently preparing an article for the

January 2006 *Ore-Cutts*, complete with illustrations and photographs. A few tidbits of information gleaned from the upcoming article are quoted below:

“All in all, there are about 59 bones in the typical turtle shell. It has been pointed out recently that the shell of turtles is made up of narrow ribs covered by dermal bone, not broadly expanded ribs as previously thought.”

“About the same time the Niobraran Seaway existed (70-80 million years BP), the coast of California ranged from San Diego in the south to near the middle of the state, near where Sacramento is today.”

“As previously mentioned, turtles appear to have weathered the catastrophic end to the Cretaceous period when a 6-mile wide meteor crashed into the earth off the Yucatan Peninsula. The immense size attained by some sea turtles seems little diminished by the disaster that wiped out about 80% of all species on earth. This fact is attested to by the fossil of an 8-foot long leatherback turtle relative that was recently discovered at Sharktooth Hill in Bakersfield. The skull of this creature measures about 14.5 inches by 12 inches.”

During the Fossil Turtle talk, Wayne displayed a partial skull cast he has borrowed from the Buena Vista Museum in Bakersfield. The massive skull was indeed impressive! Thank you, Wayne, for your presentation, and we look forward to your complete article next month.

Following refreshments, Wayne Mills presented an informative program on "Fossil Turtles". Displays this month were crystals.


The meeting was adjourned at 8:55 p.m. by President-elect Duncan.

Founded in 1958, and is named after William Orcutt, a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a district manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, Orcutt discovered the fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits, one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history. The Society is a non-profit club, dedicated to stimulating an interest in rocks and minerals. The club offers educational programs, field trips, youth activities, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in collecting and lapidary treatment of rocks, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of Earth Sciences. In addition, a goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the society's endeavors. Operating rules have been set forth to guide the Officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these purposes. Affiliations: California Federation of Mineralogical Societies and American Federation of Mineralogical Societies.
