Feathered Dragons and the KT Boundary

In November 2012, Dr. Bob Gray from Santa Barbara City College gave a presentation to OMS entitled "Feathered Dragons or the Mistaken Extinction". His premise was that the dinosaurs really did not die out at the end of the Cretaceous Period (some 65 million years ago), but that they live today in the Phylum Aves (birds). Dr. Gray showed convincing similarities in the co-evolution of the dinosaurs and the birds, and indicated some of the areas where the distinctions between the two became blurred.

Gray did not dispute that many of the larger dinosaurs, and about 85 percent of all species that were living at the end of the Cretaceous Period suddenly perished when the meteor that created the Chicxulub crater, crashed into the ocean and the northwest coast of what is today called the Yucatan Peninsula. The crater left by the meteorite is 180 km (110 mi) across, and tektites from the impact have been found as far north as Wyoming¹. The crater has been determined to be one of the largest impact features on earth. The impacting meteorite is estimated to have been 10 km (6.2 mi) in diameter and to have delivered an amount of energy 2 million times greater than the largest man made explosion, and about 400 times greater than the largest volcanic explosion ever experienced on Earth².

The first known bird was called *Archaeopteryx*, and its fossils are found in the Jurassic-aged Solnhofen Limestone Formation in southeastern Germany. To date, only 12 specimens of *Archaeopteryx* have been found, all in the same

formation³. The bird had many characteristics of modern birds, with a few exceptions. One of these is that it had teeth! The fact that the bird was so well developed suggests to some workers that there are other, more primitive bird relatives out there. Well, there are...

The earliest and most primitive theropod ("beast foot") dinosaurs are the Coelophysoidea. They are a group of widely distributed and lightly built animals that included small hunters like Coelophysis ("hollow form" referring to its light weight bones) and larger predators like Dilophosaurus ("two crested lizard"). These animals continued from the early Late Triassic through to the late Early Jurassic⁴, and oh ves, some of them had feathers. The most primitive known proto-feathered theropods are the compsognathids and early tyrannosaurus ("tyrant lizards"), both coelurosaurs ("hollow tailed lizards"). These early forms had feathers that were relatively short and composed of simple, possibly branching filaments. Simple filaments are also seen in therizinosaurs ("reaper lizards") found in Early through Late Cretaceous deposits in China, Mongolia and Western North America). These small dinosaurs also possessed large, stiffened "quill"-like feathers⁵. Therizinosaurs have recently been recognized as a sub order under the theropods. In April 2012, the largest feathered dinosaur to date was found in the fossil rich beds in Liaoning Province. He is called Yutyrannus huali ("beautiful feathered tyrant"), and was Tyrannosaurus-sized, though he lived 125 million years ago—about 58 million years before the T-Rex.6

Besides feathers which we think of as a main characteristic of birds, other features are shared between the modern and ancient dinosaurs. These include their bi-pedal nature, hollow bones, three forward pointing toes and a reversed first digit (hallux), a wishbone (furcula), a large sternum with a pronounced keel, and an alula (freely moving appendage or "bird thumb") on the anterior edge of their wings.

Considering the similarities between the modern birds and their distant cousins, I will now look on them with new appreciation, and thank the powers that be that their weightier cousins (look up *Titanus walleri* and other "Terror Birds" as well as T-Rex and his ilk) are long extinct.
