We will meet at Ralph Bishop's home at 10:00 am on Saturday, February 21 to tour his private museum. Anyone who has seen it will know that this is a rare opportunity to see premium examples of some of the most popular collecting materials in the United States. Ralph also has wonderful examples of local collecting materials, since he has lived in this area most of his life. Ralph's collection encompasses rocks, fossils and artifacts-- many of which he has personally collected during his long and colorful career. Many of Ralph's adventures are included in the archives of the Ore-Cutts that are found at: omsinc.org/archives. In case you are wondering, no, we do not have an index for all the articles we have published (but we probably should).

Ralph's home is located at 618 East Cook Street in Santa Maria. From south-bound Highway 101, get off at Main Street in Santa Maria and head west. Turn left on College Street, then turn right in three blocks on Cook Street. Ralph's is about 1.5 blocks west of College. Prepare to be amazed.

DIGGIN' STONEWALL PASS

Ole Stonewall Lingerfelt felt it was obligatory that the folks here got the diggin' news (from last month's trip), and with him vacationing in Florida, I figured it's up to me.

Well, it was a beautiful morning, and we were

packed and ready to go...no such luck. Jeannie hailed Wes "the kitchen faucet just sprang a leak". To make a wet story short, 2hours later we were on the road, and we pulled the "Lingerfelt Hilton" into Beatty, Nevada just after dark. There we met Ralph Todd and his brother Richard from Buellton, and a couple of gals—one from Australia (a fossil huntress), and the other from the Bay Area. I know Wes was hoping for a better turn-out, so I promised to be obnoxious enough for 10 people.

We got to the camp the next morning, and headed for the ash hills. We poked and prodded for half a day or so, and ended up on a hill with Wes's nose leading the way. Just another hill, except for the litter of agate for 30yards up the hill. "The game is afoot Watson" I remarked.

A majority of the agate was black dendritic moss in white to clear agate. Here and there were pastel pinks, red and yellow chips to whet the appetite. Ralph Todd motioned me over to look at a rock. It was a 4-pound piece of vein, "ho-hum" in color, but un-fractured and naturally weathered on both sides. Running horizontally was a small, round structure that sure looked like a limb cast welded to the mass. Seemed like a good test site, so I picked up my new-styled Utah Pick, nick-named "The Raptor". Everything was fine until I layed 'er down. The agate vein was 2 inches under the soil, and I don't know if my hands or toe nails stung worse. After a few muttered statements, I pried 2 or 3 twenty-pound pieces out and hollered for Wes. The vein was right around 78-inches wide with predominately black moss in clear agate.



The vein was laying with a 50degree strike to the east, and widening with

depth. As we ran the vein uphill, it widened so as to accommodate a zone of yellow moss agate. At 4 feet up the hill, the vein was 14inches wide with black and yellow moss. (Did I mention that the weather was absolutely unbearable—tee-shirt days, and cherry sunsets with mildly brisk evenings).

That evening Wes was loading the "Lingerite" under the bed and in the shower of his mobile

home. The big worry that evening was what we would do if we found any more agate tomorrow.

The next day the vein immediately widened to 18inches, and the



pink and red were increasing. By noon we knew the truck springs would scream. So we loaded the most colorful agates and decided to prospect. That basalt rim (stonewall) to the east was under-slung with pink ash. You couldn't believe what we found THERE..!

We sure missed the folks that couldn't make the trip. But there will be another trip and good rock to look for....soon.

THE WORLD'S 6 MOST FAMOUS ROCKS

Ayers Rock, Australia—Located 208 miles southwest of Alice Springs in Australia's Outback, Ayers Rock (Uluru in Aborigine) is the largest monolith in the world. It is 1,192 feet tall and 5.8 miles in circumference. It is made entirely of sandstone and is also sacred to the native aborigines.

Black Stone of the Kabbah—The Kabbah is the most sacred site in Islam. It is a black, cube shaped building made of granite and located in the middle of the Masjid al Haram Mosque in Mecca, Saudi Arabia. In the eastern corner of the Kabbah is a set of fragments of a black stone set in silver. The stone is said to

date from the time of Adam and Eve when it fell from heaven. People try to kiss the rock



as did the Prophet Mohammed, according to Islamic texts.

Blarney Stone—(Near Cork, Ireland). A chunk of Bluestone in the battlements of Blarney Castle. Kissing this stone is reputed to bring the kisser the gift of eloquent speech.

Plymouth Rock—Said to be the rock upon which William Bradford and the rest of the Pilgrims who founded Plymouth Colony disembarked in 1620. Located southeast of Boston in Plymouth, Massachusetts.

Gibralter—is a 397-foot tall promontory of limestone at the southern end of the British


territory of Gibralter which is connected by an isthmus to Southern Spain, and which guards the entrance to the Mediterranean Sea.

Rosetta Stone—Discovered in Egypt in 1799, the (45 x 28 x 11 inch) Granodiorite slab contains a decree issued by Egyptian Priests on the coronation of King Ptolemy V in 196 BC. The message was inscribed in three languages, and became the instrument for

deciphering Egyptian hieroglyphics (by Jean Champollion in 1822) that were previously undecipherable. The Rosetta Stone currently resides in the British Museum in London, England.

Quartzsite January 4 – 9, 2015 Wes Lingerfelt, OMS Treasurer

The first decision we had to make before our journey south was what car to drive. My choices were the Hyundai SUV or the big 1-ton F-350. We settled on the F-350 as we were invited out to a claim near Quartzsite to look for Jasper-agate. The claim belonged to Ron Jones and Violet Kiss who have quite a homestead in Quartzsite. More will be told about that later.

We always go down to the Snowbird Capital of the United States early in the year before the major show called the QIA Powwow held in the third week of January every year since the wholesale warehouses open around the first of January. If you go later in the month the warehouses are decimated and all the products wind up in the Powwow at three times the cost. We spent Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday shopping at Gem World on West Main Street then spent a lot of time walking Tyson Wells and Desert Gardens. There wasn't much to see. It is becoming obvious that the good rock places are being closed off and we are left with the "Leverite" of days gone by. I have better rock at home so why purchase lesser quality being offered at the shows.

On Thursday we gathered at the home of Ron and Violet for the day long field trip to their claim not far from Bouse, AZ. Several other friends of theirs were also invited to go along. We began the convoy a little after 8:00 am out to the rendezvous at the Plomosa Rd campground north of Quartzsite where more of Ron & Violet's friends were to meet us. I'm standing next to my truck waiting when a little white car drove up and the driver said, "Hi there Wes". It was Chris Dreisbach from Paso Robles now enrolled at Arizona University in Flagstaff. I was awestruck! Way out there in the middle of nowhere a fellow rockhound just happened to drive by. I invited Chris to come along on our trip with permission from our hosts. It was going to be a good day.

About half way between the campground and Bouse we made a left turn out into the desert on a very rough desert road that went through steep washes and had lots of rocks in the travelled path. I was really glad I brought the right vehicle at this point. About 3 miles across the desert we came to the claim. The area is very similar to the area in California called Hector Hills and Lavic Siding not far from Ludlow, CA. We spent the day walking the rolling hills and washes looking for the moss agate that our hosts had shown us. Being the first time on the claim it was very difficult to see anything through the desert varnish on the rocks. We filled a couple of buckets with what looked good and then took our hosts to one of my favorite places to search for Sagenite in Agate. It's located about 3 miles Northeast of Bouse, AZ.

After a wrong turn on one of the forks in the road we finally found the right spot. After all it's been a couple of years since I was out there. Ron and Violet were pleased to learn of the new digging area. I hope they can find the really pretty Sagenite agate that Ray Larson and I used to dig there.

On Friday morning Jeannie and I packed up everything and headed home. We made it to the rest stop near Essex, CA and decided to make a pit stop. I was about to pull out and get back on the freeway when a fellow came running up shouting "Hey, you have a flat tire". Sure enough the left rear tire had lost all of its air. I was in the process of getting out the jack and lug wrench when no less than six truck drivers came over to assist me. I heard one lady standing nearby say "That really strengthens my faith in human nature". All I had to do was lower the spare tire from underneath the truck and my helpers did the rest. I tried to offer them a tip but they would not take it. It's nice to know the truck drivers on the road are there if you need them.

We made it home with no more trouble and it wasn't long before Jeannie was polishing one of our new found stones. Here's a picture of the result.

We had a great trip and made some new friends. The weather was fantastic the whole time we were there. The one big problem was

the fact that once I arrived in Quartzsite I could not locate my camera. It was at home waiting for me. Just think of the many pictures and memories lost due to my failure to remember to load the camera in the truck.

In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.
