January's Birthstone—Garnets

January's birthstone is the Garnet; it is also a gift for the 2nd, 6th, 15th, or 19th wedding anniversary. The Latin work for "garnet" is "Garanatus," meaning "seedlike", a reference to pomegranate seeds that small bright red garnets can resemble. Garnet is the group name for the silicate minerals almandine, pyrope, spessartine, grossular, andradite, mozambique and uvarovite. All these minerals share similar cubic crystal structure and chemical composition. Garnet's are found throughout the world and in all colors, but blue.

For centuries garnet's have been used throughout the world. Necklaces with garnet beads have been found in graves dating back to 3000 B.C. According to legend, a garnet was used to illuminate the interior of Noah's ark. medieval times. garnet's were thought to cure depression, protect against bad dreams, relieve liver diseases and hemorrhages. In the United States garnet's

have been used as an industrial mineral for waterjet cutting, filtration, abrasive blasting and powder.

Most garnets found on the ground have formed within the Earth's crust, but some garnet's come up from the mantle during deep-source volcanic eruptions. These eruption's are the source of most diamonds found at or near the Earth's surface, but many more garnet's than diamonds come up during these eruptions. These garnet's are generally larger

in size and different from the garnet's formed within the Earth's crust. These garnet's from the mantle serve as "indicator minerals" for geologist exploring for diamond deposits.

Kid's Corner Moh's Scale of Hardness

Every mineral collector should know about the Mohs'



Scale of Hardness and the mineralogist who developed it. Friedrich Mohs was born on January 29, 1773 in the German town of Gernrode. His parents were merchants. He was well-educated. His early studies were in physics, chemistry and mathematics. Later on he took advanced studies at the mining academy in Freiberg, Germany. One of

his professors at the academy was Abraham Werner who is another important figure in mineralogy. Dr. Werner inspired Friedrich Mohs' interest in minerals.

In 1801 Mr. Mohs moved to the country of Austria. One of his jobs there was as the curator of a private mineral collection that was owned by a banker named J.F. van der Null. (a "curator" is a person who takes care of a collection of some kind.) Mr. van der Null wanted his collection to be organized into categories. He also wanted Mohs to identify the many unknown minerals in his collection.

Believe it or not, in the early 1800's no one had created a system for identifying minerals. So, Mr. Mohs started to study the different physical properties of minerals as a way to identify them. He noticed that some minerals are very soft, others are extremely hard. He also observed that harder minerals could scratch softer ones. With this in mind, Friedrich Mohs decided to develop a scratch test where he could determine the hardness of a mineral. To make his scratch test more accurate and helpful, he carefully observed many minerals and created a list of 10 minerals that he arranged from softest to hardest.

The scale is a list of minerals arranged from softest (No. 1) to hardest (No. 10) which is used to determine the hardness of all other minerals.

The mineralogist who created this scale was named Friedrich Mohs. To this very day we know this list as "Mohs' Scale of Hardness."


Quartz and crystals gold and gems salt and silver precious oil stolen and lifted by hands of men.


To begin with I would like to take a moment to





The ORE-CUTTS (named after, William Orcutt) was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor. The Orcutt Mineral Society was founded in 1958, and was also named after Orcutt who was a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences. In addition, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth to guide the officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these aims. Affiliations of the OMS include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.

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
