Orcutt Mineral Society Board Meeting - June 20, 2022

Call to Order: 7:07 pm by President, Sally Griffith

Members:

Correspondences: We received the Santa Lucia newsletter, the AFMS newsletter, another letter from the attorney about the ongoing copyright issue, an ad for a new domain hosting site (gave that to Wes), and a vendor contract for the OMS show.

Contributions: No report

Committee Reports:

1. Bulletin- We recently noticed that the R was dropped in the "Prez Box" and has been the Pez Box since January. As sweet as Sally is, we will be changing the Candy Box back to the Prez Box. Also, the date on the AFMS news was incorrect in the June newsletter. It should have said May 22, 2022.

4. Field Trips- Nothing scheduled
5. Adopt-A-Highway- Next highway cleanup will be July 9th at 8:00am at the southwest corner of Highway 101 and 166 East.
6. Annual Awards Banquet- We cannot change the location this year. We will be at the Madonna Inn for another year. They start booking Christmas requests in July so we had to let them know by July 11th if we would be cancelling. Since Jeannie was out with COVID, she didn't

have enough time to look into another location.

7. Breakfast- No changes
8. Education- No report
9. Library- No report
10. Sunshine- Stan is recovering and we hope that Jan is doing well. Jeannie and Wayne are both recovering from COVID.
11. Scholarship- No updates until after the annual show

Show:

- Security- Elaine wanted to know how much we should pay the security people per hour. We agreed that \$20 - \$22 per hour was appropriate. Renea will follow up.
- Port-o-potties - These should be taken care of. Renea will follow up with Elaine.
- Renea has a vendor that has a rather large RV at 35 feet. She asked if it was OK to have him parked partially in the food vendor area. We agreed that he needed to pay extra for the extra space and we would give the food vendor a discount. Thankfully, the food truck that the RV is displacing is smaller than a regular food truck. We just can't have him blocking the fire lane. We will follow up to make sure the food vendor is fine with the arrangement before we look into moving him elsewhere.
- We only have 5 open vendor spaces outside. All the inside vendor spaces are reserved.
- Sally looked into visors, hats, and patches. It is a \$50 setup fee for each design. We cannot use the rockhound design on the visor since it is too detailed. However, most of the board members wanted a hat with the rockhound design. We will

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purchase visors since people have requested visors at past shows, we also will also purchase regular ball caps with the Rockhound logo. We wanted to purchase individual patches with the rockhound logo on them, but we would need to sell them for \$15 or \$20 per piece. Sally will make the final decisions based on all the costs. Sally will also pre purchase the visors and the hats from Amazon to save money.

- What to wear at the show- OMS members need to wear their red vests or a red shirt and their name tag. Large OMS logo patches are available for you if you want to sew your own vest.
- We asked if someone could look over the website and make sure that the hotels, RV sites, etc were current. Tara said that she would look it over and send him the changes as needed.
- We went over the t-shirt inventory for sale. There is an odd assortment of colors and sizes. We will try to sell the old t-shirts, but we are not going to print any more for sale at the show.
- Vendor cases - Sharon has 11 vendors that could bring their own, but we have to contact each vendor and confirm they will bring them. We will still need to pull out 4 of our cases from storage. We will pull these out when we pull out the signs.
- Volunteers - Tara has a list of volunteers we could use for table set up and tear down. There are 3 different high schools and Achievement house. Tara will contact each of these groups and let them know the dates and times that we need volunteers along with Renea's contact information.

- Advertising- We still need help in this area. We will try, Next Door, Nipomo Neighbors, Central Coast Chisme, as well as FaceBook and traditional posters.
- Coloring books for the Kids Booth. Sharon shared some dinosaur coloring pages with Tara. Tara contacted the artist and he would like \$5 per master page and then we can make copies for the Kids Booth. The board agreed that \$25 for 5 pages was fine. Tara will follow up with the artist.
- Tara wanted to make signs for the Kids Booth and Hospitality so that folks would know to go talk to the Treasure Chest if they needed help. We don't have people signed up yet to cover all the Hospitality and Kids Booth shifts so we will just might need to be closed for awhile during the day. Treasure chest always has to be covered so at least folks can get help.
- Please also see old business.

Old Business: The contract is finalized and signed with the Lucia Mar School District. We are still waiting to hear about the treasure chest raffle. We were supposed to put in a request for the raffle with the department of justice 60 days before the show. We were a few days shy, but the DOJ said that we should get approval quickly.

New Business: If you purchase items or services for the club, you need to sign your receipts so that the club knows who to make the reimbursement checks to. Also, as a reminder, if you are spending more than \$50, the board needs to approve the purchase. The Santa Lucia Rock Show has offered our club a table at the "Gems by the Sea Show" so that we can promote our club. The board agreed that we would like to have this table. Betty said

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that she would follow up with their club president and confirm that someone would be working the table on September 24th.

Bismuth: What is it? How do you make it?

Elemental Bismuth is a naturally occurring metal. It was officially discovered in 1753 by Claude Geoffrey Junine, but people had been using the metals since the Middle Ages. The metal is brittle and has a pink tinge on its metallic surface. Ever wondered why Pepto Bismol is pink? It is because of this pinkness of the metal.

Bismuth may occur naturally, but its sulfide and oxide forms are also important commercial ores. As oxides form on elemental Bismuth, a rainbow of colors can form on its surface. The colors are related to how thick or thin the oxide layer is. When making the large, square shaped Bismuth crystals in a shop, the rainbow of oxide colors are prized. These box shaped hopper crystals of Bismuth that we see at many rock shows are almost never seen naturally. Almost all the Bismuth crystals we see are man made so why not make your own? A very useful article on how to make Bismuth crystals was on chemistrytalk.org/making-bismuth-crystals.

Bismuth is next to Lead on the periodic table which means it shares many of the same properties as lead. It is far less toxic than lead, but you should still take precautions when working with it. You should be using safety goggles, a dust mask, forge gloves, and a fire extinguisher. Some other equipment that you will need are; an open flame camp stove, ceramic fiber insulation (forge insulation), 2 stainless steel containers (bowl shaped is preferred), and a Dremel drill with a diamond tipped circular blade.

Here are the shorten instructions from the chemistrytalk.org website. Please refer to the whole article for more tips and tricks.

1. Put your bismuth in one of your metal containers. Turn your heat source on and let the bismuth melt. If you see a gray skin (slag) form on the surface, don't panic! That is normal. Meanwhile, preheat the second metal container.

2. Once the bismuth is melted and the second metal container is heated up, pour the liquid bismuth from the first container into the second one. Try to pour just the bismuth underneath the skin and prevent the slag from going into the second container. This slag contains impurities! Alternatively, you can skim off the slag with a spoon before pouring.

3. Try to cool the melted bismuth slowly. Cooling it slower will produce larger crystals. This can be achieved by leaving the metal container on the heat source (turned off), or by slowly turning down the heat. Do not cool the bismuth until it is solid.

4. About 30 seconds after cooling, the bismuth should start to solidify. When this happens, pour the liquid away from the forming solid crystals. The solid crystal should seem set but jiggy.

5. Be patient and let the crystals completely cool before removing them from the metal container. If you can not get the crystal out of the container, you can stick it in the freezer for a brief moment.

Your crystal is not going to be rainbow colored at first. Instead, it will be more silver-colored. Don't worry! It will quickly oxidize and you will have your rainbow crystal soon. Be sure to show off your homemade bismuth crystal!





The ORE-CUTTS (named after William Orcutt) was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor. The Orcutt Mineral Society was founded in 1958, and was also named after Orcutt who was a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences. In addition, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth to guide the officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these aims. Affiliations of the OMS include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.
