#### SHOW AND TELL Wayne Mills, Ore-Cutts Editor

Another of our local clubs, the San Luis Obispo Gem and Mineral Club (SLOGMC) will be having their shows in June and October of this year. The shows are held in the Veteran's Hall at the landward end of the pier in Cayucos. The intrepid rock blogger and man about rocks, Kim Noyes is also in charge of organizing these shows. Dates for the June Show are Saturday and Sunday June 14-15. According to Kim, this is their 54<sup>th</sup> Annual Show. This year, they have lined-up 11 dealers for the June show.

The Cayucos Show has had an interesting past. For many years, the show was run by the Estero Bay Gem and Mineral Society that folded in 1995 (there was no show that year). A local opal and sapphire dealer) organized the show for two years 1996-1997, then passed it to Richard Sittinger (former owner of Mineral of the Month Club) who helped organize it in 1998-1999. The show was passed to SLOGMC in 2000, and it became a Bi-annual Show from 2002 to the present. Sources tell me that the club is considering reverting back to one show per year. OMS celebrates our **47**<sup>th</sup> Annual Show this year.

The dates for the 2014 SLOGMC October show are the 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>, **two** weekends after the Big Sur Jade Festival (October 10-12).

### RICHARD WADE GIVES THE INSIDE SCOOP ON VOLCANOES (May 13) Wayne Mills, Ore-Cutts Editor from a talk by Richard Wade

Richard Wade gave another energetic and very informative program on Volcanoes. He did a wonderful job covering the huge subject that is indeed as big as the whole world! From the solid iron core of the earth to it's (relatively) paper thin crust, there is magma (which is by definition very hot!) When this magma finds a weakness in the Earth's crust, it makes its exit in the form of lava—molten rock. When this rock hardens, it can take many forms. Rhyolite. Andesite, Andesite porphyry, Basalt, Obsidian, Volcanic tuff, and Pumice are all extrusive igneous rocks (solidified from lava).

There are several kinds of volcanoes: from small vents that just spout steam from time to time, to eruptions that can change global temperatures (by fractions of a degree) to super-volcanoes capable of eruptions that can induce an ice-age. It was startling to discover that Yellowstone Valley is a caldera of just such a super volcano.

Because of the variety of minerals contained in volcanic rock (that has much the same composition as granite, but is more iron rich), decomposed volcanic soils foster rich growths of vegetation which attract plant and animal life, which in turn attract man and his villages and cities. This fact can in some cases be a prelude to disaster.

Richard told two stories about famous volcanoes. Some facts have been added from outside sources.

### In 79 AD, Pompey, Italy was a town of

**prosperity**. It sat picturesquely in the shadow of Mount Vesuvius, thought to be one of the minor forges of Vulcan (God of Volcanoes) due to its quiescent nature. The town had suffered damage from a large earthquake in 62 AD, but the damage had been largely repaired. On the morning of August 24, a 2-day eruption of the volcano began. It was slow enough that most of the 20,000 inhabitants were able to flee, but contained enough energy that at the end of its eruption, the town was covered with 16 feet of volcanic ash. All the remaining inhabitants and all vestiges of the town were completely entombed in volcanic ash until they were rediscovered during an irrigation project some 2000 years later. The excavation of Pompey continues to this day. Presently, the City of Naples sits near the place where Pompey is being excavated. The main value of history is to help us learn from the mistakes of the past.

**Iceland is a nation of hardy souls**. They have to be to survive the harsh conditions that they live in (the island is crossed by the Polar Circle, and is located between the frigid Arctic Sea and the North Atlantic Ocean). In contrast, the Island sits astride the Mid-Atlantic ridge, a boundary of two of the huge plates that make up the Earth's surface, and a linear weak spot in the Earth's surface where magma is quickly cooled as it hits the ocean water that sits atop it. About 6.2 miles off the southeast coast of the Island of Iceland sits the Island of Heimaey (pronounced hey may). The city of Heimaey sits in the shadow of Volcano Eldfell that formed the island relative recently (about 13 million



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years ago). On January 23, 1973, Eldfell began to erupt, spewing lava 500 feet into the air, and down its flanks toward the town or 4100 inhabitants. The inhabitants of the small island (3

miles across at it's widest) did the smart thing got off the island. Then, considering that the island had one of the best fishing ports in all of Iceland, they determined to take their town back from the volcano. Thorbjorn Sigurgeirsson had the idea to stop the advance of the lava by spraying it with seawater (which the small island had plenty of). So, to the delight of Icelandic TV viewers who called it "pissing on the lava" (only in Icelandic), Thorbjorn and his crews started pumping water on the advancing lava, creating a crust that eventually stopped the advance of the lava and saved the harbor and much of the town.

Everything was fine until the fall of 1962; can you remember the Cuban Missile Crisis? I can--- my land lady took me down in the cellar and showed me the escape route she had taken with her family during WW II. Here I was with a 4 month old baby and pretty much alone. The troops in our area were sent to the Czech border. I was able to book a dependent flight home and the landlady's son took Tammy and me to the Stuttgart Airport. I was so glad to get home. Whittier, California never looked so good. I called my parents from the airport. They didn't know I was coming home, so it was quite the surprise to them.

During this same time period Mike was on the USS Pictor (AF-54, a US Navy refrigerated stores ship) in the US Navy in the South China Sea, however we were not to meet for a few more years.

In 1969, my husband and I parted ways. In 1971 a friend introduced me to Mike Henson. When we first met we both knew there was something special between us. We were married the next November. When we went to get our marriage license I asked who this James guy is?! I thought I was marrying Mike! That is when I found out his name is James Michael. He adopted Tammy a little while later and we were a happy family. We went on a vacation every year to our favorite place--the Central Coast of California. We also spent our honeymoon here.

In 1981 Mike got a job offer from Martin Marietta in Lompoc and we were able to relocate to this area. Mike retired from Martin in 2001. Since that time, we have spent a lot of time traveling around this great country, taking pictures and looking for rocks.

### **KID'S CORNER**

### MINERALS IN YOUR HOME

**BATTERIES,** Graphite, Galena, and Sphalerite. Galena is a source of lead, and sphalerite is a source of Zinc.

**COSMETICS:** Muscovite, Hematite and Talc. Talc is crushed into a very fine powder and

used to make talcum powder and other cosmetics. Muscovite is crushed and added to cosmetics like lipstick and face powder to give a glittery look. Hematite is crushed to a powder and added to cosmetics to give a deep red color.

**DENTAL CARE:** Gold, Rutile, Fluorite and Cinnabar. Gold is used to cover damaged teeth and for fillings in cavities. Rutile is used to give color to false teeth so they look real. Fluorite is the source of the element fluorine which is combined with other elements to make the compound fluoride. Fluoride helps make teeth stronger and resistant to decay. Cinnabar is the main source of mercury. A mercury compound (called mercury amalgam) was used for many years to fill cavities. Mercury is VERY poisonous, however, and mercury amalgam is no longer used.

**RECLINER CHAIR:** Sulfur, Hematite, Magnetite and Sphalerite. Sulfur is used to make the foam rubber that is used for soft padding in the chair cushions. Hematite and magnetite are the source of iron for making the steel that is used to make the chair frame. Sphalerite is a source of zinc that is needed to make some dyes for the cloth covering.

**SUNSCREEN:** Sphalerite and Zincite. Sunscreen contains a compound called zinc oxide. The element zinc is removed from the minerals sphalerite and zincite.

**TOILET:** Feldspar, Hematite, Magnetite, Pyrolusite, Chromite, Copper, Azurite, and Malachite. The toilet is made of porcelain which contains feldspar as its main ingredient. Pyrolusite is used to make coloring for the porcelain, hematite and magnetite are used to make the steel parts (handles, inside valve pieces, etc.) Handles are often covered with shiny mineral called chrome that comes from the mineral chromite. Copper and copper ores (like azurite and malachite) are used to make the pipes that bring water to the toilet. Today, many pipes are made of plastics or flexible metal tubing as well. **TOWEL:** Sphalerite and Chromite. These two minerals are used to create dyes that are used to color towels. Bet you wondered how something hard like a mineral could be found in something soft like a towel!
