
Field Trip Report



February 16, 2002 - Our small group assembled at the Arroyo Grande Park and Ride Saturday morning, and departed about 0840 in Dick Shield's comfortable Toyota Sierra 4WD vehicle. There were 6 of us, including Harold "Lucky" Virgin and his grandson Eric Boyce, Meryl Austin, Gary Sheffield,, Dick Shields and myself. We headed north at an easy pace, talking about various topics, and soon were cruising past the stately pines of Cambira, the hordes of elephant seals and seal watchers near Piedras Blancas, then began our ascent to the Big Sur Coast past

Ragged Point and the picturesque San Carpoforo Creek. Our first stop was Sand Dollar Beach next to Jade Cove. Well, there's a lot of green on this beach, and most of it is serpentine, but the view climbing down to the beach is pretty neat. Dick got some great pictures of the horsetail rushes, and willow catkins beside the trail, and some of the huge waves that were crashing on the beach.


After an hour or so of searching, we decided to head down to Willow Creek. Just after we got there, we were treated to the breathtaking site of a body surfer cutting diagonally across the face of an aqua colored wave about 12 feet tall! The sun played peek-a-boo from the clouds, and the waves seemed to lessen in height after we had been there awhile. Based on advice we received at Sand Dollar, we sifted the small gravel at Willow, and found tiny polished pieces of serpentine and (I think) jade.



I got maybe enough for a ring, a very small ring...When Dick was ready to leave about 2, I begged an additional half hour to go up the creek to find some soapstone which we did. The hike is short but a nice scramble over and around boulders and branches, but we were rewarded with some pretty scenery and a few palm sized flakes of what to me is the prettiest soapstone I have seen (of course I am prejudiced since green is my favorite color...)



About 3 PM we headed south to Gorda for coffee and a quick tour of the C of C which has some pretty neat bric-a-brac. Then we cruised back to Moonstone Beach in Cambria for a little beach walk and a few thumbnail or smaller sized pieces of "moonstone" and more nice serpentine.

Our last stop was the "Fig Tree" in Cayucos where we enjoyed a nice sunset over the beautiful rocky beach while collecting some brecciated and moss agate. I think Lucky got the catch of the day with an 18 x 6 x 2" piece of golden moss agate he found after searching for 20 minutes or so. As the twilight gathered, we headed back to our AG meeting place looking forward to a nice hot shower and some good eats. Hopefully, all present got something nice to help remember our pleasant day. Dick had a so-so picture day, (only 52) but several of his shots were really nice (we reviewed the photos on the way home-isn't digital technology amazing!), Gary got a bucket full of material to cut, and Eric, Lucky and Merle each got some nice specimens. I got a few pieces of soapstone to carve, some tiny pieces of serpentine and jade that could be the start of a gem tree, and a double fist sized piece of brecciated jasper from Cayucos. After Paul Patrick shares the secrets of his "little trees" with us next month, I might have a yen to try to make one myself!

45-DAY JAIL SENTENCE FOR MAN WHO STOLE RARE STONES

The Honorable Daniel Creed sentenced Erik Martinez, 42, of Salmon, Idaho, to 45 days in county jail today for burglarizing a mine in a county park and stealing poppy jasper a semiprecious rock found only in the Morgan Hill area.

The court placed the defendant on three years probation and ordered the defendant to perform 100 hours of community service, pay \$1,800 in restitution, and stay away from the mine.

The defendant, who pleaded guilty in August to all charges, was convicted of four felonies and one misdemeanor. The Santa Clara County District Attorney's Office filed charges after witnesses placed the defendant at the mine in September, 2000, one month after the defendant had been told by a deputy sheriff to stay away.

The entrance to the mine, which lies on the edge of Silveira County Park in Morgan Hill, has been closed off by the Santa Clara County Parks Department.


