### **American Jade**

For centuries, jadeite has been shipped to the West from Myanmar (formerly Burma), and the West has shipped nephrite back (sometimes unwittingly, as when clipper ships carried green stones from California beaches back to China as ballast). Now, North Americans are finding excellent jadeite being mined closer to home.

Material in natural colors, ranging from bright intense greens to soft lilac, pink, blue, white, and yellow is being produced from Guatemala, the least known country as a producer of jade. Both jadeite and nephrite are white in their pure state, with all other colors caused by mixes of other minerals.

The jadeite found in the Motagua Valley, or Motagua Fault Zone, of Guatemala is likely the same as the jadeite used by Mesoamericans for 3000 years. Olmec, Toltec, Mixtec, Zapotec, Aztec, and Maya, all may have cherished this jadeite for their masks, tools, and utensils. The Guatemalan jadeite is coarser, more granular in its crystalline structure than that from Burma, although it is difficult to distinguish between them once the stone has been carved. So far no intensely green jadeite to match Burma's has been found; however, Guatemala has produced some stunningly rich, black jade, darker than any other, with precious metal inclusions, and a 'rainbow jadeite' of many colors.

The Pre-Columbian people of Mesoamerica revered jadeite above gold. Jadeite meant life, fertility, and power. The most brilliant greens were reserved for the kings and other royalty, and the source of the jade was concealed from the conquering Spaniards. The mines were lost to the world from the 1500's until late in the 20th century when archaeologists used knowledge of the Mayan culture and art to zero in on the Motagua Valley. Centuries old Mayan work sites with tools and bits of pottery were found. The separate shades of jadeite favored by different cultures were also found. The search is documented in a book *Jades of Mesoamerica*, by Fred Ward. Ref: Miller, in L. Journal, 2/01, via Petrography, 4/01

#### Are you sure it's jade?

• If a chip is knocked off, the freshly broken surface should not sparkle in the sun. If it does, it's not jade.

• If you can scratch it with a knifepoint, it isn't jade.

• If it's jade, it will be much heavier than a common rock of similar size.

• Tap the specimen with a hammer. If a moon shaped fracture appears, it is agate or jasper, but not jade.

• The only positive tests for jade are X-ray analysis and specific gravity analysis.

### Is it really jade?

Lapidaries and jewelers should constantly attempt to call their gemstones and rough materials by their correct names. The term "jade" is applied to many nonjade stones, such as:

• Korean Jade is bowenite, a hard variety of serpentine.

• Transvaal Jade is a massive variety of green grossular garnet.

• Amazon Jade is aventurine.

• American Jade is a rock - a mixture of idocrase and grossular.

- Australian Jade is chrysoprase.
- Colorado Jade is green microcline.
- Jasper Jade is green jasper.

• Flukien, Manchurian, and Honan Jades are all soapstone.

- Mexican Jade is green-dyed marble and calcite.
- Oregon Jade is dark green jasper.
- Silver Peak Jade is malachite.

Jade is a happy stone. It loves to be handled. It does not sparkle, but it glows. Jade loves water. Almost all good pieces of Jewel Jade come from pebbles that have been in water for many years. Jade pieces will definitely improve with wearing as pearls do, and although naturally cold, will take on warmth from the body.

Jade absorbs oil from the skin, and constant contact with the body will enhance the luster and bring out latent color. The people of the Far East value jade more than any other stone because they believe it brings them good luck. That is why an individual chooses a stone by appeal rather than by price tag.

That is why it is believed that a traveler wearing a piece of jade will come to no harm in an accident, but the jade will crack.

All jade varies in hue according to the impurities present. Pure jade is white. Almost all colors of the spectrum are shown in different shades: white streaked with brilliant green; grey speckled with black; misty blue mottled gold; reds, browns, lavenders, etc.

## History, Painted Rock. Carrizo Plain National Monument Via

The Carrizo Plain has a rich and interesting history. Before the arrival of the Spanish in what is now California, the Chumash, Yokuts, and other Native Americans hunted and traded here.



Dry land grain farming and ranching developed in the late 1800's; in 1912 mechanized agriculture brought largescale farming to the plain. Some of the equipment used in this early era can be seen adjacent to the Goodwin



Education Center. Today, most people come to the Carrizo for recreation, birding, hiking, photography, camping, hunting, and just to relax. Painted Rock

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Access to Painted Rock is limited during March 1 through July 15. During the months of March through May, guided tours are offered to view this magnificent representation of a time and civilization that is little known to us. Other unique features within the National Monument will also be part of the tour. From July 16 through February 28, access will be available to Painted Rock without the need of a tour guide.



An interpretive sign has been erected at the Painted Rock trailhead. The sign includes an artist's interpretation of a prehistorical Painted Rock and the former inhabitants of the area before the arrival of the Europeans. When visiting, come prepared for extreme weather conditions and watch out for natural hazards such as rattlesnakes or biting and stinging insects. Some CFMS societies already have claims and it is recommended that more societies have and share a claim. I would like to hear from all societies who have or had a society claim:

- When was your claim filed/established? How many years did you have the claim?
- Your experience of having a claim? The good and the bad.
- Where is your claim?
- Contact information for the person responsible for the claim.
- How is your claim managed?
- Who gets to use the claim; when and how?
- Do you share/allow other societies and rockhounds to collect on your claim?

If your society has or had a claim please e-mail or send me this information. This information is needed for our Land Claim Seminar in April. Please send me your reply by April 1st. I hope that representatives of several societies that have a claim will attend and share their experiences.

We also need to identify suitable sites and sites we wish to protect and to maintain access. Please send me your suggestions and recommendations.
