MEET OMS—WES LINGERFELT A Penny for My Thoughts



I was born at 1:15 AM on August 23rd 1939 in a one room shanty located in a CCC camp at Guthrie, Oklahoma. It was fierce night weather wise and in fact a ball of fire called "Ball Lightning" hit the tree outside the door splitting it down the middle and blocking entry

into the building. It then entered the only window and circled the room halfway up the wall and then exited out the same window leaving a burned ring inside the room. But of course I was too young to know anything about what was going on at the time and this was told to me by my Grandmother. I was named after the foreman of the camp, Mr. Carroll Johnson.

What I do remember very vividly is the day in the 1956 summertime recess when I was driving the circular Highland Park drive in the upscale part of Guthrie. It was a beautiful day, a Sunday I think, and up there on the swimming pool high diving board was a sight to behold. It was none other than Penny Bartholomew and she was wearing a very skimpy bikini (the first I had ever seen). I was awe-struck! I couldn't take my eyes off her! Disaster was just a few feet ahead of me.

During my school years I was fortunate to have a TV repair shop and jewelry store owned by my father to earn an income and to support a car. I built the first car I ever owned, a 1941 Chevy coupe, from parts scattered around in a junk yard paying for them by fixing car radios for the junk yard owner. I then traded up to a 1949 Lincoln. This car was a real dream boat. It was cream over bronze color and all the dials and control knobs glowed in the dark. I was in "tall cotton" as they used to say. I was the king of the cruise down Main Street.

On that fateful day my parents had traveled to Shawnee, Oklahoma to visit relatives. It was rather warm and my friend Orlin Fagan was riding in the back seat reading a comic book. I forgot all about the fact that the road ahead was a curve (other curves had my attention) and I was merrily moving along at a steady 35 mph. The crash caused my buddy Orlin to fly through the windshield and land on the pavement in front of the car. I turned my head just in time to catch my nose on the steering wheel as the motor proceeded to join me in the front seat. The speedometer was locked at 35 mph by the shattered glass. The beautiful 49 Lincoln was now a pile of wrinkled tin and steel, i.e. Totaled! My friend Orlin only had a chipped front tooth.

I woke up on the operating table at the hospital in time to see the needle working its way through my nose as the doctor sewed it back on. I was told that if I had lost another tea cup full of blood I would have perished. I spent the next two weeks in the hospital with tubes up my nose wondering if I looked any different than before the crash. I noticed that I had the word "Lincoln" spelled backwards on my chest.

My Dad related how when word came to him of my accident by the Oklahoma Highway Patrol they offered to give him a red lights and siren escort the 90 miles back to Guthrie. For all he knew I was about to die. I think my Dad aged a few years during that episode.

ARE YOU SURE IT'S JADE?

- If a chip is knocked off the freshly broken surface should not sparkle in the sun. If it does, it's not jade.
- If you can scratch it with a knifepoint, it isn't jade.
- It will be much heavier than a common rock of similar size.
- Tap the specimen with a hammer. If a moonshaped fracture appears, it is agate or jasper, but not jade.
- If it is jade, it will have a smooth, waxy, almost greasy look.
- The only positive test for jade is x-ray analysis and specific gravity tests. The more milky the water is when cutting jade, the better the grade of jade. If the water isn't milky, then you don't have true jade. You have something else.

An article in the May CFMS Bulletin states that Clear Creek Management area is open to Individual collecting on the basis of a total of 5 days per person per year. (No organized group events are allowed yet.) Entry requires a permit from the BLM with no fee attached. However,

you will need a "Clear Creek Management Pass" good for one week. The pass is available on site from "Iron Rangers", or from the Hollister Field Office of the BLM (hours 7:30 am-4:00 pm Monday-Friday).
