
ROCKHOUND OF THE YEAR AWARD


A Recap of Jim Mills April Program

Jim Mills, who has given several fascinating and original talks to our club did it again at our April meeting. He and his wife Beth, traveled to Northern England and Scotland in 2008, to visit friends and enjoy the scenery and perhaps to collect some rocks.

Jim and Beth's journey began in northern England near Manchester where they explored some of the moors-- harsh upland areas where there are no trees, and where they had to put up with vast areas of lovely, blooming heather. When they crossed into Scotland, they visited Siccar Point—an angular unconformity and one of the most famous

geological locations in the world. Here James Hutton had a revelation about the age of the Earth and eventually became the Father of Geology. The talk became really interesting when Jim discussed a racy bordering on “salacious” lady Scot—Georgina Spencer, the fifth Duchess of Devonshire, who was the first female rock collector in that country. A movie about her is simply titled “The Duchess”, but does not go into her rock collection.

Another collector that Jim and Beth visited was Renato ("Nat") Forno, a very particular (maybe even peculiar) gentleman who ONLY collects 50 rocks. If he gets one he likes better, he has to off-load one of the 50 agates that he already has. He might be a fun guy for a neighbor!

In Girvan, Scotland, Beth and Jim visited Doctor David Anderson who finally gave them some Scottish Agates since they had been frustrated in their Scottish agate collecting efforts by high tides, bad weather, and no agates!

We also learned about the origin of the jewelry material "jet"—a hard, black, polishable rock that is derived from Lignite, a form of coal. Because of its' organic origin, jet cannot be called a mineral.

Jim also told us of the spot where the first thin section of petrified wood was made, and the ~410 mya Rhynie Chert in Aberdeenshire, that holds examples of the first land plants, and is (unfortunately) off-limits for collecting.



One of the dealers at the show had this sign. I




thought it was pretty clever!
