

LOCAL ROCKS--SOAPSTONE

I LEARNED HOW TO CARVE SOAPSTONE at Camp Paradise. They have their own supply on the "campus". Sometime after returning home I found out that there was soapstone (talc) in the Big Sur area where it is part of the low-grade metamorphic (Green Schist" facies) of the Franciscan Formation.

Two places that I have collected this material in the Big Sur area are on the ridge between North and South Jade Cove, and at Willow Creek. I think the Willow Creek Soapstone is the prettiest I have ever worked with. In the Big Sur area, soapstone is closely related to actinolite, serpentine and jade. And it is relatively easy to carve. The traditional Birthstone for May is **Emerald**. Emerald is green Beryl, (Beryllium aluminum silicate). The green color comes from the addition of chrome in the formation of the crystal. The most famous location for emeralds is Muzo. Colum-



bia, but they occur at other locations, including North Carolina. The rarest form of emerals (which is quirte rare in itself, is *trapiche*, where the emerald demonstrates a 6-rayed pattern along its C-Axis. The cause of this formation is not well understood. Trapiche Emeralds are mostly found in Columbia, but they have also been found in Brazil and Madagascar.

ROCK CANDY By Elizabeth LaBau, About.com Guide: http://candy.about.com/od/ hardcandyrecipes/r/ rock_candy.htm.

Ingredients: \Box 2 cups water \Box 4 cups granulated sugar \Box 1/2-1 tsp of flavoring extract or oil (optional) \Box Food coloring (optional) \Box Glass jar \Box Skewer or thread (see below)

- 1. Prepare your materials: wash a glass jar thoroughly with hot water to clean it. Cut a length of thick cotton thread a few inches longer than the height of the jar, and tape it to a pencil. (Or use a similar sized stick.) Place the pencil across the lip of the jar, and wind it until the thread is hanging about 1 inch from the bottom of the jar. Attach a paper clip to the bottom of the thread to weight it and ensure it hangs straight down. Alternately, you can use a wooden skewer as the base of your rock candy, and use clothespins balanced across the top of the jar to clip it into place.
- Wet your thread or wooden skewer, and roll it in granulated sugar. This base layer will give the sugar crystals something to "grab" when they start forming. Set the thread or skewer aside to dry while you prepare your sugar syrup.
- 3. Place the water in a medium-sized pan and bring it to a boil. Begin adding the sugar, one cup at a time, stirring after each addition. You will notice that it takes longer for the sugar to dissolve after each addition. Continue to stir and boil the syrup until all of the sugar has been added and it is all dissolved. Remove the pan from the heat.
- 4. 4. If you are using colors or flavorings, add them at this point. If you are using an extract, add 1 tsp of extract, but if you are using flavoring oils, only add ½ tsp, and make sure you don't stand right in front of the pan—the scent can be very strong as it rises in the steam. Add 2-3 drops of food coloring and stir to ensure even, smooth color.
- 5. Allow the sugar syrup to cool for approximately 10 minutes, then pour it into the prepared jar.
 Lower the sugared string or skewer until it hangs about 1 inch from the bottom.
- 6. 6. Carefully place your jar in a cool place, away from harsh lights, where it can sit undisturbed.

- Cover the top loosely with plastic wrap or paper towel.
- 7. You should start to see sugar crystals forming within 2-4 hours. If you have seen no change to your skewer or thread after 24 hours, try boiling the sugar syrup again and dissolve another cup of sugar into it, then pour it back into the jar and insert the string or skewer again.
- 8. Allow the rock candy to grow until it is the size you want. Don't let it grow too large, otherwise it might start growing into the sides of your jar! Once it has reached the size you want, remove it and allow it to dry for a few minutes, then enjoy or wrap in plastic wrap to save it for later.

INSECT FOSSIL DISCOVERED IN OPAL, NOT AMBER


MOUNTAIN MARVEL

The ORE-CUTTS (named after William Orcutt) was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor. The Orcutt Mineral Society was founded in 1958, and was also named after Orcutt who was a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences. In addition, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth to guide the officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these aims. Affiliations of the OMS include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.
