#### **TOPAZ**

From Ore-Cutts, November 2017

November is a special month to me because it is MY birth month. Thanksgiving, autumn leaves, and all that. The two stones associated with this month are yellow to red-orange topaz, and another yellow-colored stone, citrine. Both of these sunshine-colored stones are known for their calming energies, and bringing warmth and fortune to those who wear them (according to the American Gem Society). Though topaz comes in several colors, the yellow and red-orange (Imperial) forms are the ones associated with November births. Interestingly, both Texas (where noncommercial quantities of blue topaz have been found) and Utah (think Topaz mountain near Delta), have named Topaz their state gemstone. The Birth signs for November are: Scorpio (10/23-11/21) and Sagittarius (11/22-12/21. (See discussion of Scorpio's stones in the October, 2017 Ore-Cutts.

# LOCAL ROCKS — Wayne Mills, Bulletin Editor OMS (Text and picture)

Much of the Central Coast is covered with marine sediments of Miocene (20-5 mya) and Pliocene (5-2.5 mya) Ages. These ages are represented by the Middle Miocene Age Monterey Formation, the Upper (Late) Miocene Age Santa Margarita Formation, and the Pliocene Age Echegoin Formation. These formations were at least in part shallow water formations as evidenced by the occurrences of Sand Dollars and other shallow water life forms. Onf favorite collecting location in

Lompoc has the Pliocene

age:

**Dendraster ashleyi,** a relative of the **Dendraster excentricus** that can be found on Pismo Beach in present times



Another Genus of fossil sand dollars is Astrodapsis. Multiple species of this sand dollar genus also occur on the Central Coast. Among these are:



Astrodapsis antiselli from the Santa Margarita Formation, found near King's City in Monterey County, and .

Astrodapsis spatuosis also from the Santa Margarita Formation and found near Scott's Valley in Santa Cruz County.

#### YOOPERLITE—The glowing Rock of Michigan's Lake Superior Shores



You may have seen news stories about these glowing rocks. They don't actually glow in the dark but flouresce under UV light. They are a coarsegrained igneous rock, syenite (with a composition similar to granite but deficient in quartz). This syenite contains the flouresecent mineral sodalite.

Discovered and publicized by rockhound (and now mineral dealer), Erik Rintamaki, who coined the patented tradename yooperlite (yooper is a nickname for people living in Michigan's Upper Peninsula), the rocks are also known as Keweenaw Emberlites. They are believed to have been transported by glaciers from a source in Canada. They have been found elsewhere around the Great Lakes and outside of Michigan.

Most sodalite from elsewhere glows orange, some pink, or purple, under long wave UV light. The variety of sodalite known as hackmanite exhibits tenebresence, a reversable color change, and some specimens of hackmanite actually glow in the dark (afterglow luminescence).

You too might make interesting discoveries walking around with a UV light. I have seen reports that some petrified whale bone from California beaches fluoresce.. Not only do collectors use UV lamps in hunting for minerals, but they can be useful for hunting certain fossils and, as many of you may know, scorpions.

The ORE-CUTTS (named after William Orcutt) was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor. The Orcutt Mineral Society was founded in 1958, and was also named after Orcutt who was a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences. In addition, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth to guide the officers and members of the Society in accomplishing these aims. Affiliations of the OMS include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.
