

viruses want to congregate around us. But stay positive and *wash your hands frequently* and we will be just fine.



### In Memoriam

We are very grieved to announce that we have lost three long-time OMS members in the last month: first came word that Hershel Whitefield, one of our past presidents had died:

# Hershel F. Whitefield

1919-2011

Hershel F. Whitefield passed away peacefully at his home in Nipomo with his family by his side on August 10, 2011. He was born August 17, 1919 in the small town of. Lakeview, Texas. He moved to Santa Maria, California after finishing High School. Hershel was drafted in April, 1941 and served in the U.S. Army 18th Combat Engineers during World War II in the

Aleutian Islands. It was there that he was assigned to a task force to help build the Alcan Highway, a vitally needed overland supply route. The highway acted as a lifeline for American forces in Alaska during WWII. While stationed in some of the most forbidding terrain in North America, he formed an extraordinary bond with his fellow officers and remained in close touch with them for the rest of his life. Most people will remember him as a General Building Contractor for over 30 years in the Santa Maria Valley. He enjoyed his work as a builder and all the fine people he met along the way.

He will be remembered as a man of his word and was fond of saying, "I have done many a business deal with only a handshake" Hershel was active in the community, on the Board of Appeal for the City of Santa Maria, Board member of the Carpenter Apprenticeship program, Vocational Training Center, Santa Maria Valley Contractors Association, Chamber of Commerce, Elks Lodge 1538, and the Orcutt Mineral Society. After retirement, he switched gears to growing of Avocado, Lemon and tropical trees in the Nipomo Foothills. He enjoyed traveling with his wife Mary, visiting all fifty states as well as touring many countries. His hobbies included cutting and polishing stones as well as oil painting. Hershel was an avid reader and well versed in most subjects. He was interested in world affairs, and always very fond of sharing a joke or two - with a chuckle. Hershel also found great joy being with his family and good friends. He was especially proud of his two grandsons, Rawley and Dustin.

He was preceded in death by his parents Frank and Fannie Whitefield, sisters Lorena Allen of Lawndale and Juanita Mann of Santa Maria; brother Earl Whitefield, and daughter Sheila Whitefield, both of Santa Maria. He is survived by Mary, his beloved wife of 59 years; his daughter and her husband, Karen and Randy Hermreck of Arroyo Grande; grandsons, Rawley Herrnreck of Santa Maria and Dustin Hermreck of Nipomo, along with numerous nieces and nephews.

Services to honor and celebrate his life will be held at Dudley- Hoffman Mortuary Friday August 19 at 11:00 am. Visitation will be from 9:00 am until time of funeral. Then last week came word that Kay Vollmer, "The Jade Lady," one of the pioneers of jade hunting on the California Central Coast had died. Kay was 92 years old and crammed a lot of adventure into those years! She and her husband, Chuck, raised 3 children, while hunting rocks and working a series of interesting jobs. Kay was a draftsman, a graduate of the WWII "Petticoat Engineers" program. She worked for Graflex drafting new cameras for production, and later worked as a draftsman at Vandenberg. # Kay Vollmer, the "Jade Lady" By Kay Vollmer, as told to Bess and Dick Shields

Dick and I were recently invited to visit and interview Kay Vollmer at her home in Nipomo. Kay is widely known among central coast rockhounds for her wonderful collection of jade and local materials. She shared stories about the rocks that she and

Chuck, who last year passed away, had collected over the years. Kay explained that "Botryoidal jade" is a rare form of grape-like, knobby jade. Kay has a keen eye, and is the proud guardian of some special pieces that she found on trips to Jade Cove and points north. She is especially pleased with the jewelry pieces that Chuck shaped to resemble Native American fishhooks, diving birds, and delicate filigree designs. Kay and Chuck perfected a technique for removing serpentine and soapstone clinging to their botryoidal jade by using sandblasting beads. Kay and Chuck's assignments allowed them the opportunity to collect at numerous locations which are now closed to rockhounding. She recalls collecting "jellies" (clear opals) from their Oregon assignment, petrified wood from numerous locations throughout the western US, iris agate, Sweetwater



agate, Panamint Valley specimens, Saratoga minerals, and gems from Roaring Ridge. She had many summers in Yosemite NP, and spent many years in Olympia, Washington.

Throughout the afternoon, Dick photographed many of Kay's pieces, and she remarked, "Chuck would have approved of digital photography advances". Kay likes digital photography since "It shows me right away what your picture looks like, and they can be taken over, or even deleted". Kay and Dick spent two hours in front of the fluorescent box, like kids in a candy shop, hunting for the perfect specimen. Kay

issued orders about where to fetch little bowls of "min**Ore-**erals "for her to view under the three wavelengths. She most enjoyed the rhombic calcite, Petrified wood, Botswana agate, Sweetwater agate, Saratoga Wyoming materials, Roaring Ridge beauties, and Nipomo agates (that glowed BRIGHT!). Kay is also a master beader, and

utilizes materials she has collected along the Central Coast, China Lake and Oregon in her delicate beadwork. She weaves beads around tiny sea urchins and fashions them into miniature baskets. Her dream catcher earrings are made with beads that are miniscule.

Dick's friendship with the Vollmers goes way back. Dick's parents (Allan and Bernice) and their three boys dined with Vollmers in Yosemite when Allan and Chuck were rangers (Dick was 12-13 years old at that time). Years later, Kay and Chuck toured the Eielson Visitor Center, Mt. McKinley NP, Alaska, but didn't go further out to Wonder Lake, where Dick was a ranger.

# **Bench Tips**

#### •REMOVING A STONE FROM BEZEL SETTING

If you've forgotten to use dental floss and got your stone caught in a bezel, there's one thing you can try before starting to pry. Find some sticky wax or beeswax. Roll it into a pencil-sized cylinder and stick the end onto the top of the stone. Mold it on well and yank. If all else fails, you either have to very carefully pry open the bezel with a sharp knife blade or drill a small hole in back of the stone and push it out with the point of a scribe.

#### •MAKING YOUR OWN MOKUME

# •FOREDOM STAND

A quick and easy way to suspend your Foredom over your jewelry bench is to use some steel pipe components from your local hardware store. It attaches with a couple screws and costs a little over \$10. I use 1/2 inch galvanized pipe and fittings. To build a stand that attaches to the top of your bench, all you'll need is a flange and a thirty inch length of the pipe. If you prefer a stand that attaches to the side of your bench, you'll need a little longer pipe, three foot, a flange, and a 90 degree "street elle".

Finally, make a hook that goes into the top of the pipe to hang the motor

from. You can use heavy coat hanger wire or better yet, a 1/8 steel rod from the hardware store.

•Between the dollar stores and Harbor Freight, metal workers and jewelry makers can save a lot of money on tools. A friend who taught upscale wire work always bought a lot of pliers and cutters at Harbor Freight when they had them in \$1.00 bins. He filed the rough edges and took off the sharpness and used them in his classes. He said he would rather have these pliers snap from use on too heavy a wire than his more expensive ones.

A very well known inlay mosaic artist told me that she uses a Harbor Freight diamond band saw to cut her material, cost was \$149.00. When I went to buy one, they did not know what I was speaking about. The store manager said he would track it down and did so. I told him I was going to a Rock and Mineral

club meeting in the area and he gave me a machine to take to the meeting to demo. It really went over big time. They are very accommodating there.
