

# BRAZIL 2009—WHATTA' A WAY TO START RETIREMENT

Shortly after I joined OMS in 1994, I watched a video presentation by Ralph and Helen Smith, parents of Jan Ferguson of OMS. The video was about a tour they took of Brazil with the mineral curator from the Los Angeles County Natural History Museum (LACNHM). The trip toured mines in the Minas Gerais (General Mines) Province of Brazil. It looked like great fun, so when I retired from Caltrans in April 2009 after 25 years as an Environmental Engineer, I looked into the possibility of doing the same trip.

The tour group flew out of Los Angeles on August 16, 2009, and made our first stop in Sao Paulo, Brazil the next day. The tour leader was Tony Kampf, the current mineral curator at LACNHM. Our group included 14 other folks besides Tony and his wife. On the tour, we visited 11 different mines and stayed in 6 different motels in 5 different cities, in 14

### COME EXPLORE POMPEII WITH US Elisabeth Nybo, Editor

At the OMS September General Meeting a vote was held to determine the next OMS Club Fieldtrip. Several possibilities were presented and the winner was......Pompeii, The Exhibition at the Ronald Reagan Presidential Library and Museum. Their website <a href="https://www.reaganfoundation.org/library-museum/special-exhibits/pompeii/">https://www.reaganfoundation.org/library-museum/special-exhibits/pompeii/</a>, describes the exhibit as, "...over 150 authentic artifacts on loan from the renowned Naples National Archaeological Museum in Italy. These are not replicas, but rather original, 2,000-year-old objects that were preserved in the ash. These artifacts include wall-sized

frescos, marble and bronze sculptures, jewelry, ancient Roman coins, and full body casts of the volcano's victims.

These artifacts, set in scenic depictions of their original surroundings, tell the tale of the bustling city of Pompeii, hidden from view and forgotten for centuries until its rediscovery over 250 years ago. The catastrophic power of volcanoes is also illustrated through an immersive CGI experience of the eruption of Mount Vesuvius. The impact and devastation is evidenced by full body casts (plaster casts made from the hollows left in the ash that hardened around the now disintegrated bodies of the victims, found upon excavation), eerily preserved

in their final moments."







#### **EGG CARTON ROCK COLLECTIONS**

When you are trying to make a rock collection you are faced with several problems. How do you store it? How do you display it? How do you label it? How you store it depends on how big your specimens are. There are some traditional sizes: Micromounts need a microscope or good hand lens to view and are usually stored in a .75 inch box. Thumbnail specimens fit inside a 1.25 inch cubic plastic box usually called a perky box. Miniature specimens fit inside a 2.5 inch box. Hand specimens are too big for a miniature box, but are smaller than a grapefruit. They may also be referred to as small cabinet specimens. Cabinet specimens are larger than a grapefruit, but are still small enough to pick up and put on a shelf. Floor specimens are too large to put on any shelf. **Boulders** are probably too large to bring indoors.

An egg carton works for most thumbnail and miniature specimens. Most common specimens are roughly the size of an egg.

If you go to the geology department of your local college they probably have a room full of cabinets with drawers about 3 inches tall full of minerals. The senior collectors at your local rock club probably have a basement room lined with shelves full of minerals. Most beginning collectors have a bunch of egg cartons full of rocks under their bed. Egg cartons tend to come in two styles. One has the lid textured to hold the eggs. The other has a flat lid. You want the kind with a flat lid.

Cut a sheet of paper to fit in the flat lid. Most flat lid egg cartons have a dimple in the middle, so you need two smaller pieces of paper. Divide each paper into six squares to match where the eggs would go. Glue the papers into the lid. Each square now is a label for the specimen that would be under it when the lid is closed. As you collect and identify new specimens, put them into egg cartons and update the label in the lid.

You may want to take steps to prevent the specimens from being scrambled if the egg carton gets dropped. Using glue to secure each specimen is a fairly permanent solution. Using poster Tac is less secure but allows you to remove specimens when necessary. And yes, there is special mineral Tac available if you do some research.

When your collection becomes serious you want to make a catalog of it. When you go to the library you can find books in the library catalog. You give each specimen a unique identifier. You attach this identifier to the specimen. You add this identifier to the label for the specimen. Then you create a catalog entry for the identifier that includes all details you know about the specimen. Like a library catalog (title, author, subject), you index it several ways so you can find it (minerals, chemistry, geology). You really can fit a lot of egg cartons under your bed before your growing rock collection becomes a problem for your Mom.

#### Club Award.

The cost of services are increasing at Zyzzx which is also under new management. Fees for Zyzzx Earth Science Camp will increase by \$5 each year for the next 5 years (\$400-\$425 per week). Zyzzx is such a popular camp that they often fill up on the first day of application, so CFMS had to resort to a lottery last year for the limited number of spaces at the camp.

Because of the increase in costs and uncertainty about their continued availability, CFMS is looking for a 15-20 acre site where they might have a permanent location for Earth Science Camps, and future shows and conventions. President-Elect Tony Fender recommended the AG Center in Tulare as one possibility.

There has been an interesting dust-up between the (Continued on page 12)

CFMS and the Rocky Mountain Federation over a renegade Nevada Society that left CFMS owing \$750 for Insurance, then attempting to hold a RMFMS show and convention within CFMS boundaries (this is against the rules of the AFMS). The decision on this is still pending. Along with this discussion, it was mentioned that CFMS had one claim of \$250,000 that has made it hard to get underwriters. This is why CFMS and its societies need to be prompt in paying our annual insurance bill. Our new Insurance Chairperson is Mark Nelson who is taking over for Fred Ott who held the position for several years.

There was a brief discussion about **sales tax on geodes** sold at shows. If you bought the geodes, keep the receipt to show that you already paid the sales tax, if not, that you should pay (local sales) tax on each geode sold. It is "iffy" on whether sales tax is due on materials donated to a raffle.

Another interesting situation arose when CFMS discussed selling a silver specimen from its collection to an interested buyer who valued the specimen at \$600-650. Jack Rhodes of the Reno Gem and Mineral Society who is in charge of the CFMS collection in the Keck Museum where the specimen is housed had not been contacted about the proposal, and said the specimen is the "heart of the collection", the state mineral of Nevada, AND worth many times \$650.

**CFMS President, Jennifer Haley**, is working on creating a **National Day of Awareness for Rockhounds**. Jennifer also notes that there are three **open positions** on the CFMS Board. These include: Junior Activities, Safety Committee, and Show Consultant North.

The next meeting for CFMS Directors will be in Visalia on November 10, 2018.


