

Terminology - Arsenates and Vanadates

As the title suggests, we are going to talk about minerals that contain arsenic or vanadium. This class of minerals are very similar to the phosphate class, but instead of bonds with phosphorous the bonds are with arsenic or vanadium. Sometimes the arsenates and the vanadates are grouped with phosphates into a larger class of minerals.

Like the phosphates, I have not heard of most of these minerals even though there are 94 arsenates and 32 vanadates. Most are found near mining operations of arsenic or vanadium respectively. Some are very colorful and beautiful and often have amusing names. Let's discuss the mineral Fluckite since it seems to be the most entertaining.

Fluckite is an arsenate of calcium and manganese and was named in 1980 in honor of Pierre Fluck who discovered the first specimens in Sainte-Marie-aux-mines in France. Fluckite was discovered after arsenic mining operations were ceased and geologists were trying to safely close down the mine. It is a very beautiful pink color and was unknown to the author of my 1934 book, Getting Acquainted with Minerals.



Terminology - Sulphates

Sulphates round out our lessons on the different mineral classes in geology. We have already covered haloids, sulphides, oxides, carbonates, silicates, phosphates, arsenates, and vanadates in previous newsletters. We will now end this series with sulphates.

Aren't sulphates the same as sulphites? They are both compounds of sulphur. In short, no. Sulphates contain compounds combined with oxygen, specifically SO₄²⁻ (the sulphate group in chemistry). The most recognizable of these minerals is gypsum with the chemical formula of CaSO₄·2H₂O.

Gypsum is traditionally used in our everyday life in drywall, chalk, and plaster. It is colorless to white in color, but some impurities can cause the gypsum to take on a pink, yellow, blue or brown hue.

Gypsum is easily dissolved in water so it is rare to find gypsum sand. However, there is a special place in North America where gypsum sand is present, the White Sands National Park in New Mexico. The dunes of gypsum are the largest in the world and cover more than 275 square miles of the desert. This national park is on my list to see, but have yet to make time to travel

deep into New Mexico. Did you know that you can bring your own sled (or buy one at the visitor center) so that you can sled down the dunes like you were on a Colorado ski trip? You can. You can get a tour of the Trinity nuclear test site on special days, you can visit the White Sands Missile Range Museum, and you can see the White Sands Space Harbor where the space shuttle Columbia landed in 1982. Check out https://wsmrmuseum.com/ for more visiting information. I'm hoping to make a pilgrimage in spring of next year. I will let you know all about my gypsum adventures.

Gypsum comes in all sorts of shapes and configurations. My favorite is the desert rose of selenium.

The ORE-CUTTS (named after William Orcutt) was first published in 1966. Member Helen Azevedo was the first editor. The Orcutt Mineral Society was founded in 1958, and was also named after Orcutt who was a geologist and civil engineer who worked in the Santa Maria Valley as a District Manager for Union Oil Company in 1888. In 1889, William Orcutt discovered the mineral and fossil wealth of the La Brea Tar Pits on the property of Captain Alan Hancock in Los Angeles. The La Brea Tar Pits are one of the most significant fossil finds in paleontological history.

OMS is a non-profit organization dedicated to stimulating an interest in the earth sciences. The club offers educational programs, field trips, scholarships, and other opportunities for families and individuals to pursue an interest in the collecting and treatment of lapidary materials, fossils, gems, minerals, and other facets of the Earth Sciences. In addition, another goal of this Society is to promote good fellowship and proper ethics in pursuit of the Society's endeavors. Operating Rules have been set forth to guide the officers and members of the

Society in accomplishing these aims. Affiliations of the OMS include American Federation of Mineral Societies, and California Federation of Mineral Societies.
